The First Sunday of Advent

Welcome to Park Street Church! We're glad you're worshiping with us today. If you're new, please take a look at the 'NEW' section on the back cover for some ways to connect with us.

This bulletin contains instructions (usually next to the pilcrow symbol ¶) and explanations meant to help us fully participate in our worship of God. The People read bold text with a loud voice. Scripture lessons are from the English Standard Version.

Today begins the four-week season of Advent, a word derived from the Latin Adventus, which means "arrival" or "coming," and is considered the beginning of the Church year. During these four weeks, we highlight the fact that we are an expectant people awaiting the return of our King, Jesus, to his world and his people. We look back upon the first Advent, Christ's coming in humility, and we remember the anticipation and expectation of God's people awaiting the coming of the Messiah. The season is marked by hopeful waiting and renewed repentance.

Purple is the traditional color of preparation and penitence, and is used during Advent and Lent. Purple was historically the color of kings (the dye was extremely costly) so the color also emphasizes the royalty of Christ Jesus (cf. John 19).

Musical Note: The Introits this Advent will be premieres, from a collection by renowned composer Carol Barnett, sister of Park Street's own Elaine Phillips. The music ministry commissioned these works in honor of Michael Brescia's forty-five years of service to the choir.





ADVENT READINGS

For this year's Advent readings, we're engaging in dialogue with our Regional Fellow-ships in the Church Center app. For those preferring print, a weekly list of readings is also included in the morning bulletin or on our website at parkstreet.org/advent.

Advent Day 1 | Sun, Dec 3 | Psalm 80 | Mark 13:24-37

One of the things we tend not to be very good at is waiting. However, in both of our passages today we are called to wait on the Lord's timing. In Psalm 80, the key feature of the Psalm is a prayer for God to restore and to save. In Mark 13, Jesus talks about the day when he will return and restore all things. In the season of Advent, we are looking towards this day when Jesus will return. What does it mean for us to "keep awake" as God's people while we wait for Jesus to return? What gives you hope in these passages?

Advent Day 2 | Mon, Dec 4 | Psalm 51 | Isaiah 64:1-9

Both these readings acknowledge the pervasiveness of sin in our world and the longing for God's deliverance from that sin. Why do the Biblical writers describe sin as "uncleanness"? What does the process of becoming clean teach us about repentance and forgiveness? What is the hoped-for result of God's deliverance in each passage?

Advent Day 3 | Tue, Dec 5 | Psalm 130 | 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

What do this Psalm and passage from I Corinthians have to say about why God asks his people to wait? Is there a straightforward answer?

Advent Day 4 | Wed, Dec 6 | Psalm 50 | Joel 2:1-11

This passage from the prophet Joel paints a devastating picture. The day of the LORD is coming and no one will escape the annihilation of the LORD's army. Why do you think Joel is pulling no punches here? How often does this kind of picture enter your own thinking or speech?

Advent Day 5 | Thu, Dec 7 | Psalm 39 | Joel 2:12-17

These passages speak of the fleeting nature of our existence and the need for repentance. When you think of these truths, meditate on why we so often can be ignorant of our own need for repentance. What may cause you to be unaware of your own sinful tendencies?

Advent Day 6 | Fri, Dec 8 | Psalm 25 | Luke 12:35-40

Both Psalm 25 and Luke 12:35-40 deal with the concepts of time and waiting. How is time characterized in each passage? Trace the instances where waiting shows up. What do we learn about what waiting for the Lord looks like?

Advent Day 7 | Sat, Dec 9 | Psalm 128 | Luke 12:41-48

What are some categories of things that the Lord gives his people responsibility for? Try to think beyond the usual list. What does the psalm and the passage from Luke say about the importance of our work?
