The Third Sunday of Advent

Welcome to Park Street Church! We're glad you're worshiping with us today. If you're new, please take a look at the 'NEW' section on the back cover for some ways to connect with us.

This bulletin contains instructions (usually next to the pilcrow symbol ¶) and explanations meant to help us fully participate in our worship of God. The People read bold text with a loud voice. Scripture lessons are from the English Standard Version.

The word Advent is derived from the Latin Adventus, which means "arrival" or "coming," and is considered the beginning of the Church year. During these four weeks, we highlight the fact that we are an expectant people awaiting the return of our King, Jesus, to his world and his people. We look back upon the first Advent, Christ's coming in humility, and we remember the anticipation and expectation of God's people awaiting the coming of the Messiah. The season is marked by hopeful waiting and renewed repentance.

Purple is the traditional color of preparation and penitence, and is used during Advent and Lent. Purple was historically the color of kings (the dye was extremely costly) so the color also emphasizes the royalty of Christ Jesus (cf. John 19).

Musical Note: The Introits this Advent will be premieres, from a collection by renowned composer Carol Barnett, sister of Park Street's own Elaine Phillips. The music ministry commissioned these works in honor of Michael Brescia's forty-five years of service to the choir.

#### THE POSTLUDE

Overture to Paulus "Sleepers, Wake!"

F. Mendelssohn (1809-1837)

Mendelssohn's oratorio on the life of St. Paul begins with a grand setting of the hymn "Sleepers, Wake!" God's conversion of Paul (formerly Saul, persecutor of the Church) was iconic of the awakening of the whole world from spiritual death to life. Through this man (who had been an enemy of God but was made *Apostle to the Gentiles*) all the nations were called to wake up to life as we await Christ's return.

The opening tune, noble-but-muted, evokes an expectant waiting (God's promises are sure; yet the world was in slumber and darkness). A minor-key fugue follows, with the "Sleepers Wake" theme interjecting in ever more insistent calls to "Wake up!" Finally, the tune returns in the major key and in triumph, for "now is the day of salvation."

For this year's Advent readings, we're engaging in dialogue with our regional fellow-ships in the Church Center app. For those preferring print, a weekly list of readings is also included here (and also on our website at parkstreet.org/advent).

#### Week Three

# Advent Day 15 | Sun, Dec 17 | Psalm 126 | John 3:22-30

Today's readings feature imagery of water in the desert, and surprising turns from tears to joy. In what ways, large or small, have you experienced God's surprising goodness? When you think of Jesus coming to the wedding celebration as the bridegroom, what does that joyful scene look like to you?

## Advent Day 16 | Mon, Dec 18 | Psalm 107 | 2 Corinthians 1:3-11

Ponder the tapestry of comfort, affliction and suffering Paul is weaving here. How do you respond? Paul and his companions were brought to the point of death by their afflictions. What was the result? Does this passage give you hope in the midst of your own sufferings? In what ways?

# Advent Day 18 | Wed, Dec 20 | Psalm 47 | Isaiah 2:1-5

How do Psalm 47 and Isaiah 2:1-5 describe God's kingship and reign? What parts of these passages strike you as especially beautiful? How often do you think about and hope in the reality of this future?

## Advent Day 19 | Thu, Dec 21 | Psalm 124 | Luke 1:26-38

When the angel tells Mary that she is going to bear the Son of God, the great rescue depicted in Psalm 124 begins for all of God's people. What is surprising about the way that this great rescue is initiated? Knowing the rest of the story, what is surprising about how it is carried out, and how God is still carrying it out through Jesus today?

# Advent Day 20 | Fri, Dec 22 | Psalm 135 | Luke 1:46-55

Self-confessed lowly Mary has been chosen to introduce the upside-down kingdom that will finally set the world right side up. What surprises do you find? What is different here from the way the world does things? What brings you joy from these words?

# Advent Day 21 | Sat, Dec 23 | Psalm 150 | Luke 1:67-79

Zechariah's song highlights the faithfulness of God. How does Zechariah express this? Further, God's faithful action in the birth of John and Jesus is attributed to his "tender mercy" (v78). How have we known this tender mercy in our life together? How have you known this in your own life? Does this fuel your/our praise?

#### FINANCIAL UPDATE

During the last weeks of December our congregation's M&O and Missions giving is hoped to be \$1,000,000 for M&O and \$640,000 for Missions.
